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## BYU professor publishes modern translation of New Testament

BYU classics professor Thomas Wayment published a new translation of the New Testament on Nov. 26 that is sensitive to The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints' doctrine.

Filled with extensive notes and research, the publication is 491 pages long. With each page being about two-thirds text and one-third notes, Wayment said the translation is thorough and easy to read.

"Each note is entirely new and they engage history, alternate translations, explanations, cross-references to all restoration scriptures and clarifications of problems with the New Testament Greek text," Wayment said.

There are also 22 new maps and a synopsis of the four Gospels favoring the chronology of the Gospel of Mark. The text is presented in paragraph form with verse divisions minimized so readers can encounter the Bible as it was originally written. In the Gospels, each section has a short title with cross-references to the other Gospels where the same story is retold, according to Wayment.

"Quotations are noted through the use of quotation marks, and quotations of the Bible are noted through italics. All quotations of the Old Testament are noted in the footnotes as well," Wayment said. "The notes alert the reader when an Old Testament quotation is quoted differently by a New Testament author."

Wayment has been working on this project for half of his time spent as a BYU professor.

"If I include all of my false-starts and stops, the project took about 10 years. I worked more intensely on the project for the last five years and for two years it was about the only thing that I did academically," Wayment said.

Wayment has been specifically trained in understanding the textual transmission of the New Testament, the sources used to create the New Testament and how the book's text developed over time.

"My Ph.D. and M.A. work were done in New Testament Studies, and my B.A. work was done in classics,"

Wayment said.

Wayment initially did not intend to publish his translation but planned to translate the works for his own personal religious study. However, he saw the value in creating a translation that made scripture easier for others to understand.

"I think all graduates with Ph.D.'s in New Testament studies have translated a significant portion of the New Testament at some point in their careers. For many years, I felt a personal desire to translate the entire thing for my own academic development and interests," Wayment said. "Over time, the interest to do that merged with a growing sense I had

that the King James Bible was difficult to understand for many readers."

This new translation sets itself apart from other versions, according to Wayment.

"I think its sensitivity to Latter-day Saint beliefs and interests will make it helpful and different. There is no other Bible resource like it, particularly with respect to its notes," he said. "I believe that by using gender-inclusive language, modern readers will come to understand that the Bible was written equally to men and women."

Wayment's writing process was careful and concise. Making sure not to exclude any meaningful resource,

Wayment said he drew upon 18 years of teaching the New Testament, a wealth of academic training and publications, numerous Bible commentaries and published translations.

"I have read and looked up every footnote in the LDS King James Bible and read every entry in the Bible Dictionary and other sources provided by the Church. I have tried to make this comprehensive and careful in its approach," Wayment said.

BYU ancient scripture professor Nicholas Frederick wrote his review of the book in the BYU Religious Education Review and expressed his pleasant surprise at the translation's quality.

"I have to admit that I was quite skeptical that this Gordian knot would ever be satisfactorily cut, let alone untied. Now, after having read through Dr. Wayment's book, I find myself surprised that he was able to resolve these issues so succinctly and thoroughly," Frederick wrote. "The spirit of the King James Bible is still present, and it hasn't been so much modernized as it has been clarified."

BYU religion professor Jason Combs said he found Wayment's translation to be the most comprehensive translation of the New Testament to date.

"For amateur and professional scholars who are interested in restoration scripture (the Book of Mormon, Doctrine and Covenants, Pearl of Great Price), Wayment has assembled the most comprehensive collections of connections between those books of scripture and the New Testament ever published," Combs said.

Combs related an experience he had with a sister in his last ward who was depressed and turned to the scriptures for help. She let the pages of her quadruple combination fall open and it opened to one of Paul's letters, but she couldn't make any sense of it.

"The (King James Bible) translation of Paul's letters was too difficult for her to penetrate. This experience convinced her that she must have offended God and that God no longer loved her — all because she could make sense of English from A.D. 1611," Combs said. "Wayment's translation not only provides a modern English translation from the original Greek but is chock-full of detailed footnotes to aid the reader."

With the new year approaching and a transition to two-hour Church meetings, the Church is placing a new emphasis on gospel study within the home. Combs believes Wayment's translation will aid in this process.


"If I could recommend only one resource to help with the study of the New Testament this coming year, it would be Thomas Wayment's study edition and a new translation of the New Testament," Combs said. "With greater emphasis being placed on personal and family study, there is a greater need for resources to help us navigate challenging passages in scripture."



## Anita Hill's Utah speech a preface to D.C. hearing

For Anita Hill, the integrity of the Supreme Court was what mattered when she accused Judge Clarence Thomas of sexual harassment after he was nominated to the Supreme Court by President George H.W. Bush in 1991, making Hill a national figure.

"This was at stake in 1991," Hill said. "And it is what is at stake today."

Now a professor of social policy, law and women's gender and sexuality studies at Brandeis University, Hill spoke before more than 600 people at the University of Utah on Sept. 26.

Hill spoke the night before Christine Blasey Ford, who accused Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh of sexual misconduct, testified before the Senate Judiciary Committee. Hill recounted her own experience with that same committee to contextualize her view of the Kavanaugh hearing.

Hill said the Kavanaugh hearing may prove similar to the hearings held for Thomas in 1991. She said the Senate has already decided what to rule and that its decision to "rush to a vote" reflected a prioritization of political values over human values.


## One experience being Jewish in America today

## Latter-day Saint missionaries to receive mission calls online



## BYU Cambodian Oral History Project connects generations

From 1975 to 1979, Raet and the country of Cambodia lived in terror under the reign of the Khmer Rouge communist party and its leader, Pol Pot. Millions of Cambodians were kicked out of their homes, forced to labor in rice fields without adequate food or rest and dragged to treacherous prisons where they were tortured and later executed.

Those seen as potential threats, specifically educated people, were targeted: teachers, doctors, even those who wore glasses. Nearly two million Cambodian lives, one-fourth of the country’s population at that time, were destroyed.

For various reasons, including a lack of records and especially painful and traumatic memories, some of the survivors have never shared the stories of their past.

Until now.

The Cambodian Oral History Project, formally launched in 2016, aims to capture stories like those who lived through the Khmer Rouge regime and keep them from fading, according to director of the project Dana Scott Bourgerie, a BYU professor and chair of the Department of Asian and Near Eastern Languages.

## Sexual assault resources on campus ‘empower’ students



## BYU students help fulfill nation’s promise to never leave a soldier behind

On July 27, 55 boxes of what are believed to be the remains of fallen American soldiers in the Korean War were returned to U.S. soil after 65 years. At some point, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency will process the remains with the hope of identifying these soldiers.

Since its formation in 2015, the DPAA dedicates countless hours to recovering and identifying the remains of fallen American heroes so the agency can provide the fullest possible accounting to the families of the missing soldiers. Its mission is to account for every missing soldier back to WWII.

BYU students in the Center for Family History and Genealogy are helping in these efforts to reunite the fallen soldiers with their families. BYU is participating in the DPAA Repatriation Project by doing genealogical research.

“It is just a very sweet experience to be involved in this project and to be able to assist our country,” said Director Jill Crandell.

There are currently 82,000 soldiers missing since WWII, according to the DPAA, and about 73,000 are fallen soldiers from WWII.

## READERS' FORUM Why I go to BYU

Today I was reminded why I go to BYU. I woke up early this morning. I needed to make sure I had time to get to class in the Tanner, I wasn't sure how my motorcycle would fare in the snow. I also wanted some extra time to print off my MComm project. After printing off my project, I took the elevator down two floors and started walking to class. Another student passed by and told me in a rushed way something had just happened in the atrium. About the time I got to the second story balcony was when the paramedics arrived. I won't describe the scene. I've been around death, I've been around blood, but this was something entirely different. I think it may be because of the setting. A campus building. A fellow student. The bird's-eye view. The balconies towering above. The group of onlookers mounting. Even the big Christmas tree stood silently above her. Not knowing the how or why immediately empowered the terrible and natural curiosity that drives us in these events. It was a horrible, harrowing scene that I couldn't stop thinking about all day. But I was far from alone. Shortly after I saw the paramedics give the girl CPR and then roll her away on a stretcher, my MComm professor offered a prayer in the class. Few times have I ever felt the spirit so strongly from a group of people. Every single heart in the classroom was in humble supplication to the Almighty. The prayer was collective. Professor Thomas' words came out as if I had uttered them myself. Next class period, in my Book of Mormon class, we discussed 4 Nephi. We focused on what made the Nephites so special at this time and the impact of a resurrected Christ. A few hours later, my Information Systems professor stopped lecture, seemingly able to look each one of us in the eye, and told us that we were not simply numbers here at BYU. She was refreshingly honest about her own struggles with depression. As if I hadn't seen enough love from a variety of faculty, I stayed 15 minutes after my humanities class and discussed the blessings and difficulties of teaching at BYU with my professor. She reminded me again that to receive a valuable education, the student must first value education. The support I received on campus was matched by the support I received off campus. When I got back to my apartment, I just started crying. My roommate just hugged me for a second, not saying a word. I received texts and calls from old roommates, FHE members and classmates. One of my sisters called me out of the blue, and we discussed her battle with postpartum depression. My other sister — who is 8½ months pregnant — called, and we discussed the excitement of pregnancy and new life. My girlfriend made me lunch and listened to me share my feelings from the day. The point is that today I saw the true nature of this school that I love so much. Today I learned by study and by faith. I know as well as any Provo has its difficulties. Just like anywhere else, you've got some of everything at BYU. I, however, do not go to BYU for other people. I go to BYU because it pushes me along in the path of discipleship. I go to BYU because days like today remind me of the tangible love around me. I go to BYU because the Lord's hand is seen in every nook and cranny of campus if you only have the eyes to see it. Today, BYU reminded me of a poem by Rudyard Kipling:

*Though all we made depart  
The old Commandments stand—  
"In patience keep your heart,  
In strength lift up your hand."*


